#### Dear volunteer,

I am really pleased to introduce the first of our Quarterly Update newsletters of 2023. I started with the RNLI over a year ago as the Water Safety Education Manager for the South West. I would like to take this opportunity to tell you a little more about myself, how I have found the role over the last year and some of the direction that water safety is taking in the South West region with regards to education. Before joining the RNLI I worked a number of seasons as a beach



lifeguard having grown up in Devon, since then I have spent the last 15 years teaching outdoor adventure at both university and college level in Cheltenham.

I was excited to be able to join the RNLI in the region I call home and everyone has been extremely welcoming. I found during the start of my role I spent a great deal of time listening to you, our volunteers. Hearing from you directly and getting to understand you better. Doing this has highlighted several areas of training and process that I have enjoyed working on and helping to improve.

I have seen first-hand the passion and impact you have on children and young adults you present to. ## Merchant Navy Association Boat Club: WaterWatch initiative

The Merchant Navy Association Boat Club (MNABC) established the WaterWatch initiative to help promote vital RNLI water safety messaging, and ultimately, to help reduce the number of drownings on the coast and inland waterways. This initiative utilises the wealth of experience of the members of the MNABC and other partner organisations - such as the Norfolk & Suffolk Boating Association (NSBA).

Participating volunteers are known as WaterWatch Crew Members.



These teams of experienced boaters and skilled observers help to:

- Spot potential incidents and hazards.
- Respond by reporting detailed information about the nature of the incident to HM Coastguard, the appropriate inland waterways authority or other emergency services.
- Stand-by ready to assist the co-ordinating authority, depending on the circumstance and what's needed. For
  example, by maintaining a visual watch over the site of the incident, providing on-going situation reports,
  taking photographs etc.

Our initiative is progressing well, particularly in the area of The Broads, where our crew have already assisted with several incidents. WaterWatch Crew Members are part of a motivated and enthusiastic team, having the opportunity and satisfaction of putting their boating experience and expertise to good use by helping to enhance safety on and around their local waters. All whilst protecting the boating environment and promoting responsible behaviour. 
This plan details our behaviour change approach in our Water Safety work, and goes into more detail around how we will deliver this through:

#### 1. ASSIST

By influencing others, organisations and communities may be better situated to take a lead on delivering messages and interventions to at-risk groups.

#### 2. SUPPORT

We can't do this on our own. We need to grow our network with high impact partnerships and develop opportunities for others to support or lead on activities.



#### 3. PROVIDE

The RNLI will lead on interventions directly targeting at-risk audiences, whether it's a pub conversation with friends, a chat with a family on a beach, a school talk, or a media campaign. Interventions and resources with an educational nature have been proven to help change people's behaviour, such as with government campaigns like: THINK!.

# IRELAND

#### **YAP Foundation Training**

Ireland was delighted to facilitate the Young Adult Programme (YAP) training at the Swords Regional Base this January. In total, 14 of our water safety volunteers have now completed training in YAP and will be going to colleges, universities and further education schools to deliver this leadership, teamwork and decisionmaking course to audiences aged 16-25 years old.





#### Waterside Responder Training

The outdoor workers of the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon (ABC) Council in Northern Ireland, delivered the Waterside Responder scheme at their offices in Lurgan. Many of the workers operate along canals, rivers and lakes in their area – and the ABC Council have committed to buying throw bags for all their vehicles.

#### Water Safety Workshop

Our Water Safety Team in Sligo, led by Water Safety Officer, Cillian Murphy, delivered talks with a group of 400 Ukrainian's who are now living in the local area. Specific risks such as local tidal cut-off issues were discussed to help keep them safe in the area.



**BeeSafe** - Volunteers Peter Scott, Patricia Storey, David McCausland and Patrick Bunting delivered five days of water safety programmes as part of the BeeSafe initiative with Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council. They spoke to 360 children throughout the week.



#### **Howth Transition Year Students**

Four days of water safety programmes, including the Young Adult Programme, were delivered to transition years students from seven different secondary schools for the week beginning Monday 6 February. Lead by Water Safety Volunteer, Rose Michael, with the assistance of Ian Sheridan and Kieran O'Connell. As part of the programme the students were tasked to create their own water safety map of Howth, showing all the ring buoys, Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) and emergency signage. <u>Click here to view the map</u>.



## SCOTLAND



### **Skills Scotland**

In November 2022, the Scotland Water Safety Team attended Scotland's largest skills, career and apprenticeship event. Water safety volunteers attended the Skills Scotland event at the Scottish Event Campus to engage with 4,000 young people – to share prospective RNLI opportunities and key water safety messaging. Water safety volunteers were joined by the RNLI Engineering and Apprenticeship Teams, coming together and creating a buzz around all things lifesaving. The attendees had the opportunity to compete in a timed RNLI crew kit dress-up activity, as well as participate in a water safety quiz which allowed key messages to be highlighted.

Kirkcudbright based Water Safety Volunteer, Keith Armstrong said: 'I was delighted by the range of engagement from the young people about who we were and what we do. They had access to learn more about water safety, careers, the 'Float' messaging and access to the teachers regarding education visits and online resources. And I think we even found a future new crew member for Broughty Ferry RNLI. I really enjoyed working with the other RNLI teams and it was great to meet fellow water safety volunteers who until then, I had only seen online via Teams.'

Ron Copeland, Water Safety Volunteer from Largs said: 'The demographic of older secondary school pupils are not who we most commonly engage with. It was great though as most pupils and teachers we interacted with were all keen and interested in the RNLI. And the fact we had apprenticeship and job opportunities gave the stall real value to the young people. We worked really well together as one crew with all elements complimenting one another. The attendees could get more detailed knowledge about the apprenticeship around engineering, we – the water safety volunteers, could engage directly with the students and get them to

## **Ramsgate Water Safety event**

Ramsgate Water Safety Team shared their knowledge with students completing their Royal Yachting Association (RYA) Day Skipper Navigation course. The 24 students and three of their tutors, from the Royal Temple Yacht Club, were welcomed to the station by Neil Morgan, Volunteer Lifeboat Crew, who is in charge of Community Water Safety for Ramsgate RNLI. Neil's team was supported by the wider RNLI team, including two other volunteer crew, and representatives from Ramsgate RNLI Management Team.

adding her experience during the presentation and at the Very High Frequency (VHF) radio demonstration (demo) station. The presentation and workshop centred on calling for help, lifejackets, Man Overboard (MOB) and throwlines. The attendees were given an hour-long presentation by Brian. They were then divided into groups and split between the five workstations (with an RNLI water safety volunteer at each of the five stations).

The workstations were MOB, kit demo, calling for help on a VHF radio (aided by our Coastguard colleague), lifejacket clinic, and lastly to practice throwbag throwing. The session went down a storm and I think it should be replicated further. It helps to tackle real issues within the yachting and motorboating communities in relation to boosting knowledge and confidence of individuals and all members of the crew onboard – and this in turn, means a better – more robust safety culture on vessels going forwards.

As part of their syllabus the students are examined on different aspects of water safety, including how to identify if a life jacket is safe, how to fight a fire onboard a ship, and how to use flares safely. The students were split into three groups and were taken onboard the all-weather lifeboat to be instructed on fire safety. They were then given a demonstration on how to identify problems with life jackets, how to use and dispose of flares, and how to deal with cold water shock and how to float to live. Afterwards, one student from each group took part in a fun activity, putting on a full RNLI wet weather suit, life jacket, boots and helmet against the clock. Although this caused much amusement, they were impressed to learn that from the moment the pagers go off, to the crew arriving at station, to being fully suited leaving on the boats – is only 10 minutes. They were even more impressed when they realised they were volunteers. We created a pop-up shop in the station so attendees were able to purchase a memento of their evening.

Andrew Beaumont-Hope, Head of the Navigation School at the Royal Thames Yacht Club said: 'We are so grateful to Ramsgate RNLI for giving up their time on a cold evening and allowing our students to have some hands on experience – which is the best way to teach water safety. For some of them, this was their first introduction to the RNLI and they felt privileged to have been allowed onboard the lifeboat, and to meet these courageous people who volunteer to save lives at sea.' Water Safety Officer, Neil Morgan said: 'This is the first time we've done something on this scale at the station, and we were delighted with the reception. ## NORTH AND EAST

As a Water Safety Team here in the North and East region, we have been reflecting on our activity from 2022 and beginning to plan and deliver our interventions to ensure we have a greater impact and sharper focus throughout 2023. Working within the timeframes of our regional delivery plan, we have several <u>Water Safety Advisor and</u> <u>Officer volunteer roles</u> currently being advertised.

From Scarborough to Brancaster, and Harrogate to Buxton, we have received great interest across the region that we will begin to onboard as new members of our teams and support their activity in the community.

This month sees the start of our Water Safety Volunteer Training in eight different locations across the region (over February and March). This training is providing us with the opportunity to upskill and update our teams across our coastal and inland locations. Covering core training modules, activity specific information and ensuring they have access to the current data, evidence and trends that help us to remain at the forefront of drowning prevention whilst working alongside our internal and external partners.

## Water Safety Partnerships

Our Young Adult Programme training has begun, with the first delivery of the risk management and awareness tutorials and workshops for Public Services students attending Colchester Institute. We now have facilitator pairs in Essex, Norfolk and Yorkshire (west, south and east). Two new facilitators recently attended the training in Dublin, so they can be advocates for the programme and build new relationships with further education establishments in north Yorkshire and Tyne and Wear. A recent event at York St John University saw the team working with the Yorkshire lifeguards to engage with students about how they can be as safe as possible in and around the city. But it was also used as a recruitment opportunity for our RNLI lifeguard and water safety advisors and ambassador vacancies. We recorded over 80 interactions at the 'Re-Freshers' event, and it has led to several expressions of interest in our lifeguard opportunities. We also gained an invite to the York Water Safety Group to help support their local interventions.

**Angling:** Seahouses and Amble Water Safety Teams are continuing to provide information and guidance for a whole season of winter fishing competitions on the Northumberland coast. Lynsey, Iain and Aaron have been working hard to influence the community and are reporting some great success in changing the behaviour of those they encounter.

## **Open water swimming**


A series of open water swimming presentations have been taking place over the last couple of months. Liam and the Norfolk and Suffolk Water Safety Teams had a great response from the local community. Whitby hosted their first talk on the 28 January. The response to the offer of information sharing meant they had



to rapidly arrange a second session on the day – and are already making plans for another update in the lead up to Easter.

Four of Whitby RNLI's Volunteer Crew Bod Marr, Ally Brisby, Andy Brighton and Matt Sharpe, shared their expert knowledge with sea swimmers from Whitby and beyond. Around 90 people attended over two sessions. They listened to a presentation and had the opportunity to ask questions at the end. The simple but important messages shared were; stop and think, stay together, float to live and call 999. Ceri Oakes, Lifeboat Press Officer at Whitby and Founder of Whitby Wild Swimmers said: 'We all learned something from the talk, the knowledge and experience the crew share is invaluable. 
## Beach Hazard Forecasting in Crantock Beach, Cornwall

Working closely with the RNLI, Crantock Steering Group and wider community groups, the <u>SWEEP Team</u> delivered daily hydrodynamic bespoke forecasts for Crantock Beach (providing up to 5 days pre-warning of peak bathing hazards) and forecast outputs for potential public-facing usage. Drawing on these, and working with the wider project team, SWEEP contributed to the development of new innovative digital beach hazard warning signage, now installed at the car park of Crantock Beach. Informed and enhanced RNLI practice, ultimately saving lives – The work SWEEP have done at Crantock has contributed to the fast-tracking (delivered in 6 months, following 5 years of discussion) of this ground-breaking intervention delivering public-facing, digital beach hazard messaging for safer use of the sea. The establishment of the local Surf School and Crantock's Surf Club WhatsApp Group, contributed to an incredible 31 'out of hours' rescues and assists, and 91 'out of hours' advisories during the 2021 season.

Adrian Carey, Head of Region for the South West said: 'This SWEEP project is exactly the sort of work our charity likes to align with. We've been impressed, not only with the well-researched, cutting-edge science the team have brought to this forecasting tool, but the professional way in which they have thoroughly tested and validated the data with local knowledge and experience – and worked with us to track and evidence impact.

Continuing to build on their strong partnership with SWEEP, the RNLI are committed to continue strengthening local community water safety collaborations, developing, monitoring and evaluating the impact of Crantock's digital signage on people's behaviour, further sharing of the learnings from Crantock within the RNLI, with the potential for this approach to become part the future RNLI organisational strategy.'

## WATER SAFETY PARTNERSHIPS - IRELAND

## **GAA Healthy Clubs**

Our Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) volunteers from Enniskillen attended a Healthy Clubs conference in Fermanagh this month (11–12 February 2023). ### Simply Blue events

Cork water safety volunteers attended three public consultation events held by 'Simply Blue' – a wind energy company operating across the UK and Ireland. A total of 250 students attended each event and received water safety messaging. This opportunity to collaborate came through working with Mary Creedon, RNLI Fundraising and Partnership Lead in Ireland, and we hope to deliver at similar events in the coming months.

## BIM and RNLI Man Overboard sessions in Ireland



We have just completed the third and fourth Man Overboard (MOB) sessions at the National Maritime College of Ireland in Cork. These sessions are now funded by Bord Iascaigh Mhara (BIM), the Irish agency responsible for developing the Seafood Industry. The sessions educate fishers on the value of wearing a Personal Floatation Device (PFD) and having a means of calling for help.

We were delighted to have some of our Crosshaven volunteers come along and get involved, assisting with the lifejacket packing and throw-bag throwing to pull the fishers to the safety of the liferaft. Thank you to Alex and Michael Livingstone, Phil Maguire and Alan Murphy. Our first two sessions were <u>delivered in Donegal in January</u> <u>at the Errigal Training facility</u>, where again we had great attendance and we're really seeing the skippers and business owners driving this safety session to their crews and staff. We have funding for a further two sessions in 2023. A fantastic partnership in action and a great example of how our partnership work with other organisations can have greater impact and save more lives.
