Dear volunteer,

The RNLI has saved more than 146,000 lives since 1824, and Water Safety is a key pillar of our lifesaving effect to save more lives as we embark on our third century. Naturally, I have spent recent weeks reflecting on where we have come from, where we are today, and where we are going in the future. As I hand over to Peter Sparkes, I leave assured that Water Safety is in safe hands, and I wish you the best for your ongoing efforts to Save Lives at Sea.

Lifeguarded Beaches

Water Safety Partnership Update

British Canoeing have re-branded to Paddle UK due to the rapid growth in recreational paddling by a broader and more diverse audience. The new name reflects the demographics of their evolving membership and is far more inclusive as it captures more fully the breadth of paddling activity that fall under their responsibility including kayaking, canoeing, stand up paddleboarding and paddlesport. The Scottish Canoe Association and the Canoe Association of Northern Ireland have also rebranded to Paddle Scotland and Paddle Northern Ireland respectively with Canoe Wales looking to follow suit in due course.

This summer we continue to work with Paddle UK to encourage safer paddling in the UK with a joint safety campaign launching mid-June. More information and resources will be shared soon.



Stay afloat, stay in touch, stay put

The RNLI is launching refreshed safety messaging and interventions for boat users to give them the best chance of surviving in an emergency.

Enjoying time of the water is one of the greatest joys in life for sailors and powerboat users. But it's easier than you think to get in trouble at sea. The refreshed safety messages are to help boat users be prepared and know what to do is something goes wrong – giving them the best chance of being rescued and coming home to their family.

Water Safety Education Partnership Update

This year, our partners at the <u>Andrew Simpson Foundation are</u> <u>celebrating 10 years</u> of transforming lives through sailing. Our team have been working in collaboration since <u>2019</u> in Portsmouth, Portland and Reading - and more recently in Birmingham.

ASF have worked in collaboration with our partners at Swim England and our team to build elements of <u>Swim Safe</u> into their programmes to support those taking part in programmes - piloting first at ASC Birmingham in 2022 to address the risk to communities across the city.

"There is a barrier to getting in the water due to the large number of people who cannot swim or who have lower than usual levels of trust in the water. In order to address the issue head on, water safety and confidence sessions are being delivered as stand alone sessions or integrated into larger sessions...this approach has shown significant success in reaching out to communities across the city that have been difficult to reach." ASF Impact Report 2023

The Foundation plans to expand its work over the next 10 years, so please look out for centres opening in your local area and reach out to your Water Safety Education Manager for more information.

Float to Live Launch 2024

This year we're very excited to announce our Float to Live campaign will be launching on Tuesday 21 May at the stunning Sky Pool 'floating' swimming pool venue in London.

Suspended 35m above the ground, the Sky pool forms a bridge between two buildings at the Embassy Gardens development in Wandsworth, South London. Bathers can enjoy the very unique sensation of swimming in midair, safe in the knowledge that the 25m heated pool features a 12-inch-thick acrylic base supported by a hidden steel frame.

RNLI Lifeguards and one of our Lifeboat crew members will be on hand at the event to give live Float demonstrations in the Sky Pool. One of our Float to Live case studies – Michael Whiteley – will also be in attendance to share his story of how using Float to Live helped save his life.

Together with our partner, Helly Hansen, the RNLI will be using this distinctive setting to launch our 2024 Float to Live campaign with a bang, broadcasting the Float to Live message to the gathered media.

It promises to be a memorable event!






Float in 2024

Partnerships

The momentum of collaborating with stakeholders and businesses who are interested in supporting our water safety messaging has continued.

We have seen an increase in the water safety bookings for the Gaelic Athletic Association Clubs in this second quarter of the year with many more booked in quarter three. Our new water safety resources for the Gaelic Athletic Association clubs will also be delivered this month providing Float to Live posters in Irish and English language to be displayed in the dressing rooms.

We have been working closely with Water Safety Ireland and the Irish Coast Guard on water safety press releases targeting key days in which we see an increase in calls to 999. Throughout April and May we saw three press releases on St Patricks Day, Easter and the May Bank Holiday.

In February we were presented with an opportunity to work on a pilot water safety programme with the trainee recruits of An Garda Siochána in Limerick. The feedback that we received has been excellent and we are hoping to see more of this in the future.

We are also delighted to have been able to partner up with the Port of Cork, Knock Airport and City of Derry Airport who have all collaborated with us on our 200th celebrations and have allowed us to display our Float To Live messaging.





A sad goodbye

We are saddened to hear that, Mary Breen; Water Safety Adviser for Lough Ree Lifeboat Station for many years has passed away.

We wish Mary's family our condolences at this time.

Education

Our education volunteers have been busy within the last quarter making sure our water safety messaging has reached as many children as possible around the region.

We saw a programme called Student Safe run in Baldoyle, Dublin, which has been identified a high-risk county. Along with other emergency services 350 students received a wide range of safety messages. In Nenagh, the tourist office organised and facilitated us for another two-day water safety education event which saw another 301 students receive our vital messaging. This was also another recognised high-risk county with inland lakes.

Thank you to all our volunteers who have been visiting schools within the last few weeks.





In other news

During March and April our focus was on sailing and boating. We ran two highly successful events in Howth and Dun Laoghaire which incorporated boating safety talks and life jackets checks.

Many lifejacket clinics have been completed and in February 84 lifejackets were presented at these clinics with a fault rate of 74%. We have asked for our lifeboat press officers to post more information about lifejackets on our behalf to not only provide more awareness to wear them but to also maintain them.

As part of this focus, we have also attended the Dive Show and the Skippers Expo meeting with both boat users and commercial fishermen. We were also delighted to be part the St. Patricks Day parade in Dublin this year.

SCOTLAND

Hello and welcome to Water Safety Scotland's spring quarterly update for 2024.

As an indication, at the time of writing this there has been 110 completed evaluations totalling 20,000 water safety engagements with members of the public. 74 of these interventions are through delivery of our youth messaging in schools and youth groups.

Irvine Maritime Museum

Water Safety volunteers, Richard Paton and Vincent McWhirter have been working collaboratively on a Water Safety exhibition at the Scottish Maritime Museum in Irvine. The exhibition, that will be in place until September at the Maritime Museum consists of model lifeboat displays, history boards of Troon lifeboat and lifeboat videos consisting of film clips interspersed with Water Safety education messages. The museum itself hosts historic craft and lifeboats including RNLB TBG, pictured below, and has supported us in showing some of the RNLI's history for its 200th Anniversary. The museum has also agreed to share our Water Safety messaging with schools and youth groups that will visit and will be keeping us updated with the amount of engagements that they complete over the summer period.





May Day Dook

Water Safety Officer for Anstruther lifeboat station, David Corstorphine has played an integral role in delivering our dipping and cold-water messaging to students at St. Andrews University who, in an annual tradition perform a cold-water dip at East Sands Beach on the breaking of dawn on May Day.

Prior to the dip, David had managed to encourage the University administrators to share our messaging in a University wide email to over 10.000 students alongside useful information for the dip and links to the RNLI's webpage.

On the morning of the dip, David attended a briefing at 03:45am. This was hosted by the University student services along other emergency services to an audience of around 3000 students. When David left at 06:15 am there was a trickling of students eager to join this longstanding tradition but their main difference now as that they were equipped with a more in-depth knowledge of how-to cold-water dip safely.

Multi Agency Water Safety Day

On a soggy Sunday in April, Teddington water safety team took part in the annual Water Safety Day hosted by the Crown Estates Commission at the Virginia Water Lake. Amongst many other organisations, the well supported event included representatives from Surrey and Berkshire Fire Brigade, Royal Life Saving Society, Surrey Police and Ambulance Service, Surrey Canoe Club and the New Foundland Dog Rescue team.

The event saw interactive throw bag sessions, plus bankside demonstrations of water rescues by both fire brigades. The RNLI Water Safety Team and the fire brigade led the way in delivering Key Water Safety Messages and even though the weather tried to spoil the event, the teams still interacted with great numbers of the public who were very keen to get involved.

Meet the Lifeguard Programme

We are really proud that over the last couple of months lifeguards from across the region have been delivering our Meet the Lifeguard programme in both primary and secondary schools throughout Thanet, East Sussex, Chichester, Portsmouth and London, reaching so far over 8,000 young people. This programme compliments the brilliant work which our water safety volunteers do when delivering in education establishments and it targets hard to reach groups who will not necessarily have had any previous water safety awareness.

We are especially very excited to have ventured into South East London this year where we have been reaching young people who have had little exposure to the coast or even an aquatic environment. We invited along the Black Swim Association to one of our sessions to support us in how we utilise this programme moving forward and reach as many young people from African, Asian and Caribbean communities as possible. The feedback was both brilliant and constructive and we will continue to work closely with the Black Swim Association and other organisations to develop our content for this programme in the future.



Lifejacket Clinics

Over the last few months as a region, 25 lifejacket clinics have been undertaken engaging with over 700 individuals. May bank holiday saw a flurry of activity with a pop-up lifejacket clinic organised by Bembridge water safety team checking 53 jackets and imparting advice to over 60 individuals. Over the same weekend Teddington water safety team ran a lifejacket clinic at Shepperton Marina. 87 lifejackets were checked with 33 advised to be taken out of service.

SOUTH WEST

Water Safety

The Water Safety teams across the South West have been actively engaged in training for the coming summer season and assisting others with training. The Isles of Scilly water safety team now have trained education volunteers on the island their water safety team have also assisted in the delivery of some throw bag training to the local fire service.

The water safety team in Falmouth have been incredibly busy delivering water safety in the community and have been receiving great reviews. A member of Mylor Yacht Club stated; 'it was one of the best presentations I've attended, thank you' after attending a presentation by Falmouth water safety team.

Th water safety teams across the South West are now looking towards the large and smaller events that are planned across the region. Some of the bigger shows include the County Shows, Bath and West Devon County and the Royal Cornish Show. There is a special excitement surrounding the shows as this is our 200th year and the RNLI is the chosen charity for some of these larger events.

Water Safety Education

This year has seen another record breaking year for the Meet the Lifeguard Programme in schools. The programme has reached 403 schools so far with trained lifeguards delivering a targeted beach safety meet the lifeguard programme to 49,294 school children in the South West from the 15 April to the 3 May 2024.

Our amazing water safety volunteers who are education trained have been busy participating in life skills events for upper primary school aged children and they have also been busy spreading our core water safety messages within schools and youth groups with a special emphasis to the RNLI's 200th year.

The water safety team in Teignmouth have been busy delivering our Young Adult Programme in large further education colleges. The programme has now reached seven large further education colleges in the South West this year and the programme is really building on the fundamental relationships with these colleges. One example is Bicton college. Volunteers have previously delivered the Young Adult Programme to the protective services students and after were invited to attend a ceremony in April marking the students completion of their 100 mile charity trekking challenge in support of the RNLI and Royal Marines Charity.

Holy Island Taskforce

Over the Easter holidays, the water safety team at Seahouses lifeboat station began their yearly taskforce at Holy Island. Every year members of the public get cut off by the tide at the Island causeway and is a top risk for the lifeboat station.

Seahouses Water Safety Officer, Lynsey Carr and Water Safety Adviser, Iain Saunders have been speaking to people face to face to make sure that everyone crossing the causeway is kept safe. To plan for these interventions, the team looked at the top risk periods for when people were more likely to get into trouble. Over the busy easter weekends the teams have managed to engage with over 100 people during the high-risk period.

Girlguiding North and East - Mayday Mayday!

On 1 May 2024, we invited 40 local rainbows, brownies guides and rangers, their unit leaders as well as county and divisional commissioners for the UK's largest youth organisation dedicated to girls, to launch the water safety resources and Mayday badge at Bridlington lifeboat station.

The event started with an introduction to the challenge park from one of its creators, Water Safety Advisor and lifeboat visits team member for Bembridge Lifeboat Station, Deborah Meadows.

We heard inspirational presentations from British Adventurer and Girlguiding ambassador <u>Jasmine Harrison</u>. Jasmine holds two world records for being the youngest solo woman to row across the Atlantic Ocean and the first female to swim from Lands End to John O'Groats. We then heard from Anna Heslop, who told a story about her unique introduction into the RNLI after witnessing an incident and making the emergency call for the 'Sea Police' and how she is now in command of the boat she called for as the first female helm at Cullercoats lifeboat station.

We are the second area to launch the Mayday Mayday! Challenge pack resource and we will continue to work with other Girlguiding regions within the North and East region to promote the opportunity. With 42,000 members now having access to the information we can hope that we are creating some safer individuals and communities when visiting open water sites and potentially inspiring the next generation of future crew for the RNLI.

A special thanks to Bridlington lifeboat station management team, crew, water safety and engagement volunteers who made the launch an incredible success by providing the venue, activities and hopefully lasting memories for all those who attend.

Water Safety in Cumbria

Informal Partnership with Beach Wardens



We are supporting Anglesey Council Beach Warden teams with very basic water safety information that is important for what they do and is easily accessible in their roles as wardens. In preparation for the 2024 season, 15 beach wardens across Anglesey have been provided with this basic information. The Mumbles Water Safety Signage

After the regional 'Get Connected Event' our Water Safety Team at The Mumbles lifeboat station, Kate Croall Water Safety Officer and Sidney Wilkins, Sandra Knight and Roger Jenkins, Water Safety Advisers, identified an urgent need for tidal cut off warning signage on The Mumbles middle and outer island. The team were keen to lead the project and started researching local signage companies that could potentially help them. Kate sought out who the islands were owned by to seek the permission of the landowners for the signage to be placed.

After communication with various departments including the council and numerous site visits to the Islands along with the help of Josh, lifeboat coxswain. Kate was able to submit plans for the proposed locations of the signs. Photos were taken by Kate on a spring high tide to highlight the contrast between low and high tide and were chosen for the signs. QR Codes were produced, and the signs were ready to be printed. With all the above information Kate was then able to get quotations for the signs and posts.

After the close liaison with Swansea Council, it was agreed the council would provide the signs and to site them on the council owned islands. The private lands owners had also agreed for warning signs to be placed in what was deemed a high-risk area and these signs were kindly provided to us by the manager of Signs Express, Sharon Perkins. Kate also wanted to make good use of an existing portable RNLI information sign. Again, Sharon from Signs Express has kindly provided the team with a vinyl sticker with the warning messages to add to the sign.

Kate and the team have managed such great work within 3 months just in time for the busiest period of summer.

His Majesty King Charles III announced as RNLI's new Patron



King Charles III succeeds Quen Elizabeth II and continues the tradition of patronage for our charity by the reigning monarch, which began when RNLI was founded in 184 with King George IV as its patron.

The King has a long history with the RNLI and has made several visits to lifeboat stations and sites over the years with the most recent to St Ives RNLI Lifeboat Station in July last year.

His Majesty's first ever engagement was on 7 July 1964 when, as the Prince of Wales, His Royal Highness accompanied The Price Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh and HRH The Princess Royal to Cowes on the Isle of Wight to observe sea trails of a new Waveney class lifeboat.

During the 1980s, His Majesty officially named the Arun class lifeboat *Snolda* in Aith, Scotland and the Rother Class lifeboat *The Princess of Wales* in Barmouth.

The appointment of His Majesty King Charles III as Patron has been approved by the RNLI Trustee Board, in line with our charity's constitution and byelaws. To read the full article then visit Volunteer Zone.

RNLI lifeboat crews and lifeguards saved 355 lives last year



The RNLI has released its operational figures for 2023, revealing that our charity's lifeboat crews and lifeguards saved a total of 355 lives last year – almost one life saved for every day of the year.

The data captured between January and December 2023 – highlights the continuing demand for the services for our volunteer lifeboat crews, with 9,192 lifeboat launches over the course of the year. RNLI volunteer crew members saved the lives of 269 people over the course of 2023, whilst the charity's beach lifeguard saved 86 lives.

As we head toward summer, we're getting ready for our lifeguards to return to beaches, while also encouraging public to answer the call for this year's Mayday campaign.
